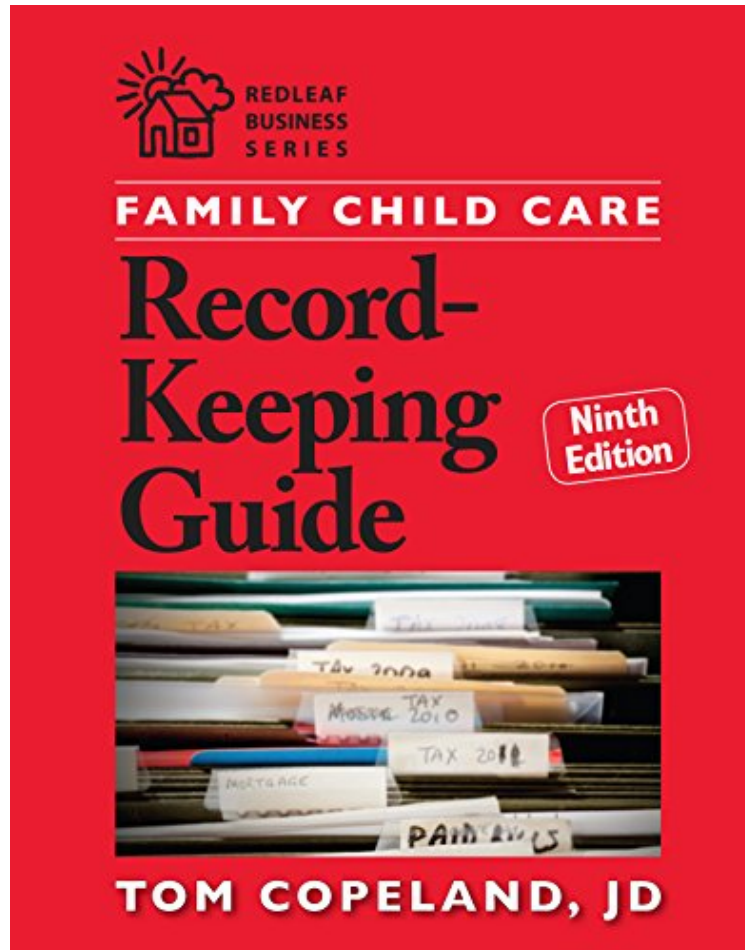

Further necessitating this ninth edition, the IRS issued two significant new rules in 2013.
